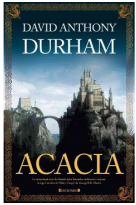

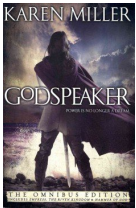


Acacia: The War With the Mein, Book One

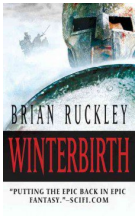


The Grace of Kings

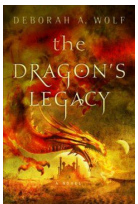

If you like long waits between books ;-)

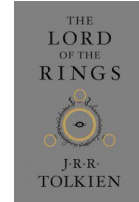


The Name of the Wind

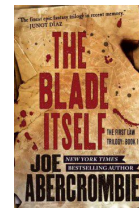


Nevernight
