




Rain Reign

How Louis Braille, after losing his eyesight in early childhood, wanted to read so much that he invented a touch alphabet.




This Kid Can Fly: It's About Ability (Not Disability)




The Someday Birds




As Brave As You

When Genie and his older brother spend their summer in the country with their grandparents, he learns a secret about his grandfather and what it means to be brave.




A Boy and a Jaguar

The renowned cat conservationist reflects on his early childhood struggles with a speech disorder, describing how he only spoke fluently when he was communicating with animals.







Daniel and Miss Elaina visit Prince Wednesday's castle for a play date with Wednesday's cousin, who wears braces on her legs to help her walk.




Curious George Joins the Team




A Boy Called Bat




The War That Saved My Life

A young girl with disabilities and her brother are evacuated from London to the English countryside during World War II, where they find life to be much sweeter away from their abusive mother.




Macy McMillan and the Rainbow Goddess

Despite a crippling disability Princess Matilda longs to write a book, but her life is turned upside down when politics and greed send her on the run with two would-be dragon slayers.




Fish in a Tree
