




#### A disability history of the United States




#### Being Heumann : an unrepentant memoir of a disability rights activist

Paralyzed from polio at eighteen months, Judy Heumann began her struggle for equality early in life. From fighting to attend grade school after being described as a "fire



by James I. Charlton


