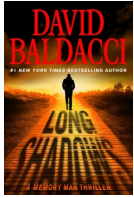

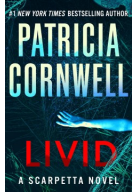

By David Baldacci

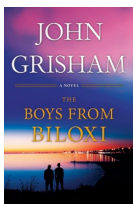

by John Grisham

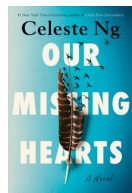

by Debbie Macomber

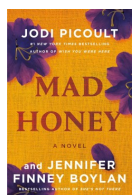

by Jodi Picoult & Jennifer Finney Boylan

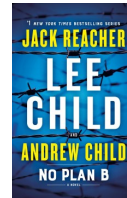

by Cormac McCarthy

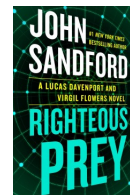

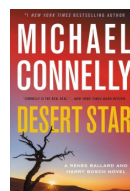


Righteous Prey

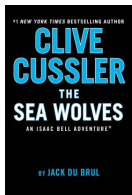

by Michael Connelly

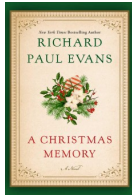

A poignant, deeply felt novel about loss, grief, the healing power of forgiveness, and the true meaning of the holiday season. (11/22)



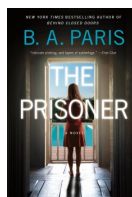
The Twist of a Knife

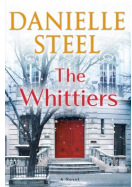


The Prisoner

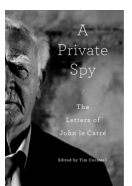
Tom Clancy Red Winter
