
There There by Tommy Orange

A novel—which grapples with the complex history of Native Americans; follows 12 characters, each of whom has private reasons for traveling to the Big Oakland Powwow.




Disappearing Earth by Julia Phillips


Nothing to See Here by Kevin Wilson

Agreeing to help her former college roommate care for two stepchildren who possess the ability to spontaneously combust when agitated, Lillian endeavors to keep her young charges cool.




Ninth House by Leigh Bardugo


The Feather Thief by Kirk Wallace Johnson


The Tiger by John Vaillant
