





Sold on a Monday by Kristina McMorris

When struggling reporter Ellis Reed takes a photograph of a sign advertising two children for sale in 1931, it leads to his big break and evokes memories from his past.




The Red Lotus by Chris Bohjalian


The Last Year of the War by Susan Meissner

A German-American teen finds her life and identity turned upside-down when her father is accused of being a Nazi sympathizer, triggering her family's forced relocation into a Texas internment camp.




Someone We Know by Shari Lapena

A man with a past shrouded in mystery searches desperately for a missing teenage girl whose disappearance is triggering disastrous consequences throughout her community and the world.




The Masterpiece by Fiona Davis
