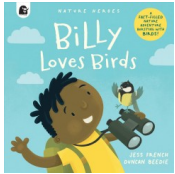




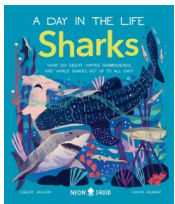

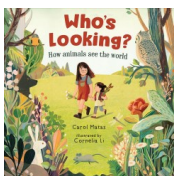
A beautifully illustrated nonfiction story following great whites, hammerheads, whale sharks, and more over the course of one day.

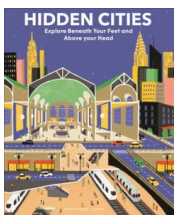

by Carol Matas

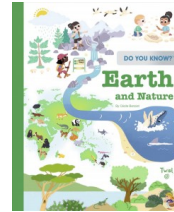

by Irene Noguera

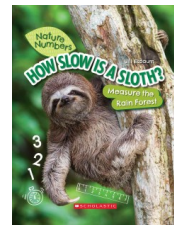
Discover the underground city in the Australian desert, Canada's subterranean shopping arcades, New York's web-like subway system, and other cities hidden beneath the ground.

by Cecile Benoist

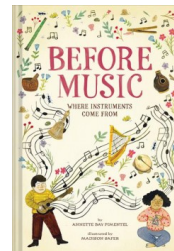
