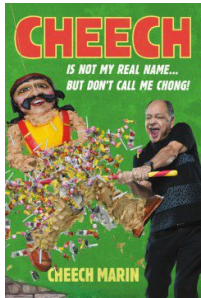

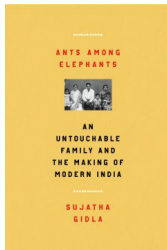
Offers a look into the daily lives of refugees, describing the experiences of the author and a variety of other individuals as they seek asylum and are eventually resettled.



Cheech is not my real name : but don't call me Chong!

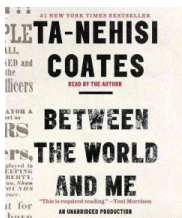

The author presents a history of racial discrimination in the United States and a narrative of his own personal experiences of contemporary race relations, offering possible resolutions for the future



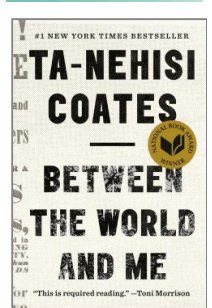
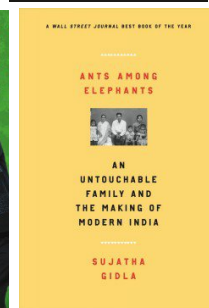
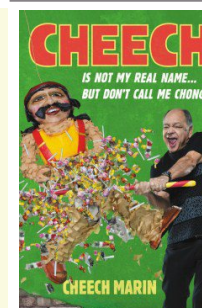
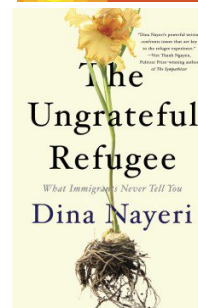
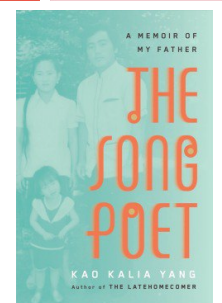
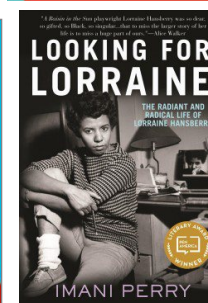
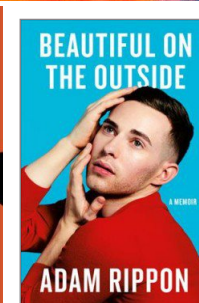
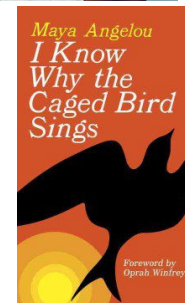
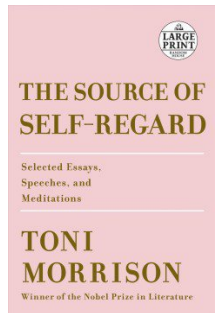
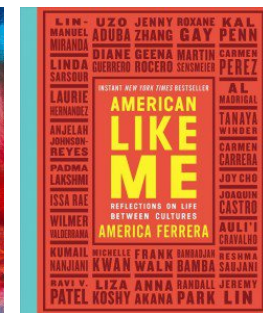
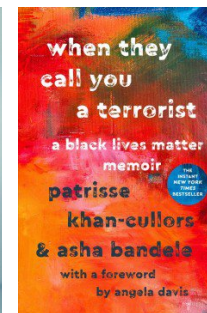
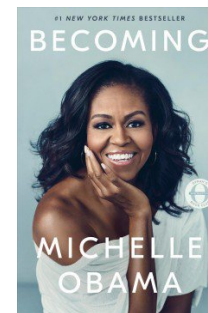
