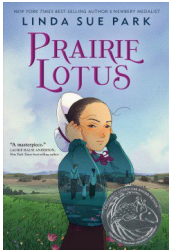

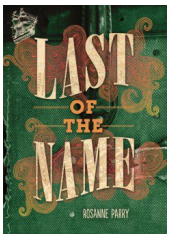

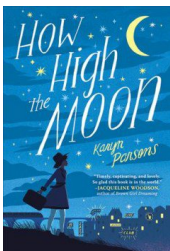
A young half-Asian girl arriving in 1880s America struggles to adjust to new surroundings while navigating the almost unanimous prejudice of the townspeople in her heartland community.

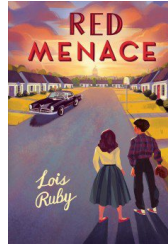

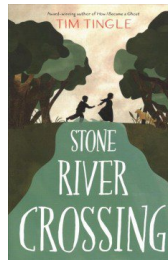
A fictionalized biography of the Japanese mountaineer recounts how Junko's determination helped her become the first woman to climb Mount Everest.

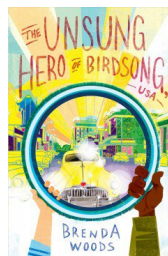
During the summer of 1953, 13-year-old Marty's parents are suspected of communist sympathies, upending his life and causing him to question what it really means to be patriotic.

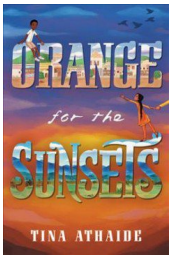

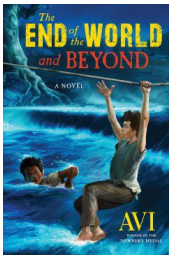


Orange for the Sunsets

Two 12-year-old best friends who have never cared about their differences are torn apart by president Idi Amin's decision to expel Indians from 1972 Uganda.

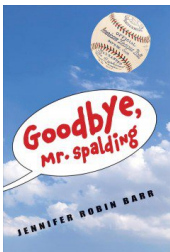


The End of the World and Beyond

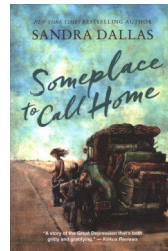


Sky Chasers

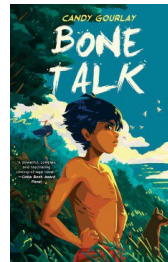


Someplace to Call Home

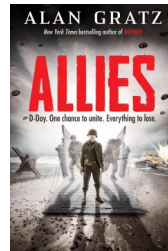


Bone Talk

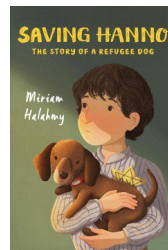


Allies

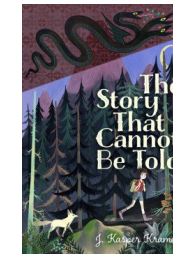


Masters of Silence

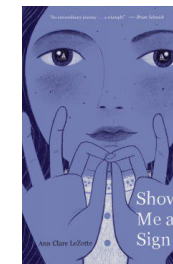


The Story That Cannot Be Told
