


The Witch of Blackbird Pond




The Hobbit




After Earth is demolished to make way for a new hyperspatial expressway, Arthur Dent begins to hitchhike through space.



F Steinbeck


In depression-era California, two migrant workers dream of better days on a farm of their own until an act of unintentional violence leads to tragic consequences.






Little Women

Chronicles the joys and sorrows of the four March sisters as they grow into young ladies in nineteenth-century New England.




My Side of the Mountain


The Adventures of Tom Sawyer

Recounts the tragedy that strikes the Meeker family during the Revolution when one son joins the rebel forces while the rest of the family tries to stay neutral in a Tory town.




Lord of the Flies

A group of English boys are stranded on an uninhabited island when the plane that is evacuating them from a war-threatened England crashes. Without adult supervision, the boys regress to savagery.




The Outsiders

The struggle of three brothers to stay together after their parent's death and their quest for identity among the conflicting values of their adolescent society.




Across Five Aprils




A Separate Peace




The Call of the Wild

When Buck is stolen from his kind family, he must quickly learn a new set of survival rules as he is taken away to the gold-crazed North by unsavory men.




The Giver




Anne of Green Gables
