



### Being John Lennon

Provides an intimate yet unsparing biography of one of the greatest and most mythologized musicians of the 20th century.




### In the Dream House


### Long Live the Tribe of Fatherless Girls


### Know My Name


### Red Comet

Focuses on Sylvia Plath's remarkable literary and intellectual achievements, while restoring the woman behind the long-held myths about her life and art.




### Handsome Johnny


### Hollywood's Eve


### The Yellow House


### Edison


### Featherhood
